Family Oral History Interviews

Some of the best storytellers in our lives are right in our own homes! Students can practice their speaking and listening skills by conducting oral history interviews with family members.

10 Tips for Young Oral Historians:

- 1. Prepare some questions ahead of time.
- 2. Listen to understand, not to respond.
- 3. Record the interview and take notes.
- 4. Think of activities that you enjoy. What kinds of activities did your subject enjoy?
- 5. What moment in recent history are you interested in? What was your subject's experience during that time?
- 6. Think about what matters to you now and ask about equivalent things from your subject's life at that age. For instance, how did they connect to friends in a world without cell phones?
- 7. Ask them to show you a picture or keepsake that means a lot to them.
- 8. Watch one of their favorite movies or TV shows from their youth together, then discuss it.
- 9. Switch roles! Kids can be great interview subjects, too.
- 10. Share what you learn with other people in your life.

Suggested Questions:

- What was your childhood like?
- What music did you like to listen to as a teenager? How did you listen to it (CD, radio, records, etc.)? What were some popular dances that went with that music?
- What are your favorite family traditions or holiday memories?
- If you grew up in a different place from me, what was that like?
- What is your proudest moment?
- What is your favorite place you've ever been?
- If you could give advice to yourself at my age, what would it be?


Staff Picks
